

President's Message - February 2011

Plenty of snow now, but Spring is on the way—birds moving north, mammals beginning to move about more freely; soon there will be the first appearance of green growth on the vegetation and some of the fish will be moving into the shallows to spawn. And we will again see more people at the Refuge.

Friends of the Refuge continues to be active.

In addition, a Friends member leads a monthly nature walk on the first Saturday of the month, using the different trails in the Refuge. See this newsletter or the website for location and time of these monthly walks.

In the autumn of the past three years we have hosted the art work of the St. Albans Artists Guild, placing their art on the walls of the Refuge Headquarters. These art shows have been so successful that we are planning to place local wildlife art on the walls of the Headquarters year round. We're hoping to begin in late spring.

For those who have not heard, on Dec. 31st Mark Sweeny retired as manager of the Missisquoi National Wildlife Refuge. Mark has been manager for the past 11 years, and will now be able to spend more free time in the great outdoors, looking at birds and chasing after animal tracks. Judy Edwards, who is the Refuge staff biologist, has been serving as the temporary manager for the past several weeks. The Refuge system will soon appoint an interim refuge manager who will serve for approximately 90 days. It is hoped that the permanent manager will be in place by June. Spring Activities Schedule at Missisquoi National Wildlife Refuge

All programs and tours are free, but reservations are required where noted.

Owl Prowls

Saturday, February 26 - 6:00 PM to 9:00 PM and Saturday, March 12 - 6:00 PM to 9:00 PM

Join refuge volunteer Jeremy Brooks for two evening "Owl Prowls" to watch and listen for some of our resident birds who operate during the night shift.

The first walk is on February 26 at the **Stephen Young Marsh Trail** area. (See directions below.)

The second walk is on March 12 at the **Black/Maquam Creek Trail**. (See directions below.) Dress appropriately and bring a low intensity flashlight with you.

Monthly Nature Walk

Saturday, March 5 - 9:00 AM to 11:00 AM

Join Friends of Missisquoi NWR member Joe Belanger for a walk on the **Jeep Trail**. The Jeep Trail offers a riverside trek along the Missisquoi River as winter begins to relinquish its grip on the refuge. The canopy of large silver maples, cottonwoods, and swamp white oak trees offers possible sightings of pileated woodpeckers, hawks, red fox, white tail deer and perhaps a glimpse of a few of the more hardy very early migrants such as great blue herons. Meet at the Louie's Landing fishing access parking area on RT. 78.

Vernal Pool Walk

Friday, April 1 - 6:00 PM to 8:00 PM

Join Park Ranger, David Frisque for a look at the life and activity in a vernal pool early in the spring. Vernal pools are important breeding areas for some of the more reclusive and seldom-seen amphibians such as wood frogs and salamanders. Because these temporary wetlands often dry up completely by late summer or early fall, egg laying and early development of juvenile salamanders and frogs must begin early in the spring. The walk will be at the **Stephen Young Trail** area. (See directions below.) Bring a small flashlight and waterproof footwear.

Monthly Nature Walk

Join Joe Belanger for a walk on the **Black/Maquam Creek Trail**. Some early migrants should be pushing into Vermont by the date of this walk with waterfowl, great blue herons, and red wing blackbirds present on the refuge at numerous locations.

Join refuge volunteer, Greg Simard on a Woodcock Walk on Friday, April 22, 2011 from 6:30 PM until 8:30 PM. The walk will be at the **Stephen Young Marsh** area. (See directions below.)

Woodcock have a unique courtship display that incorporates an aerial display and ground level calling display which occurs near sunset and into the early evening hours. Join Greg for an enjoyable early evening walk to witness this unique springtime activity.

Refuge Green Up Day

Saturday, May 7 - 9:00 AM to Noon

The Missisquoi NWR will conduct Refuge Green Up Day along with the rest of Vermont. All participants should meet at the Louie's Landing fishing access parking lot. The refuge will concentrate its efforts on river cleanup activities using refuge boats. The refuge will monitor river water levels and flows. Should floodplain water levels be excessively high or if flow rates in the river channel are too strong due to snow melt and spring rains, this event may be postponed or canceled.

International Migratory Bird Day (IMBD) Saturday, May 21 - 7:30 AM to 3:30 PM

The Refuge will celebrate International Migratory Bird Day on Saturday, May 21, 2011. The theme for the 2011 IMBD Program is "Go Wild, Go Birding" and is intended to introduce new people to birds, birding, and bird conservation and as an outdoor experience. Our birding activities will begin at 7:30 AM with an orientation at the refuge headquarters. The refuge will continue its efforts to document species on the refuge via the refuge trails and waterways using boats and, if there is interest, using canoes and kayaks as well. We will record all species and as many individuals within those species as we can and then tally the results over a light lunch.

All birding participants will return to the refuge HQ by 11:30 AM to tally results and have lunch. A speaker (to be announced) will follow at approximately 1:00 PM with a presentation on a topic in keeping with the International Migratory Bird Day theme.

The Friends of Missisquoi NWR Annual Board Meeting will begin at the conclusion of the guest speaker's presentation. All activities should conclude by 3:30 PM.

We ask that interested participants call 802-868-4781 to sign up for a birding activity (boat trip, canoe/kayaking, or trail walk).

Monthly Bird Monitoring Walks

Friends board members Bridget Butler and Ken Copenhaver will lead bird monitoring walks on various refuge trails on the third Saturday of each month. The purpose of the walks is to gather long-term data on the presence of birds, their abundance, and changes in populations. Observations will be entered into the Vermont e-Bird database where data is stored by the Cornell Lab of Ornithology and the National Audubon Society. These walks are appropriate for all levels of birders and provide a wonderful opportunity to learn about birds throughout the seasons. All walks will be from 8:00 AM to 10:00 AM. Reservations are not required.

Directions to the Trailheads

Stephen Young Marsh Trail and **Old Railroad Passage Trail**: Both trails start at the Tabor Farm Parking lot, located off of RT 78 on Tabor Rd. From Route 78, follow the signs to the refuge headquarters. Proceed on Tabor Road about ¾ mile past the headquarters. The parking area is on the left directly across from the Stephen Young Marsh.

Black/Maquam Creek Trail: Meet at the refuge parking lot on the south side of Route 78, 2 ½ miles west of Swanton. When driving west from Swanton, the parking area is on the left just after the first refuge signs.

After 11 months of bird walks, 131 participants have observed 86 species and counted 1658 individual birds. The statistics below were downloaded from www.eBird.org, where we report all of our counts online. However, many more birds are out there waiting to be found! According to eBird, 176 species were reported in 2010 in all of Franklin County, and I'm betting that most of those species were present on the refuge.
